**Designed to assess student preferences for classes and services in in-person and online formats**

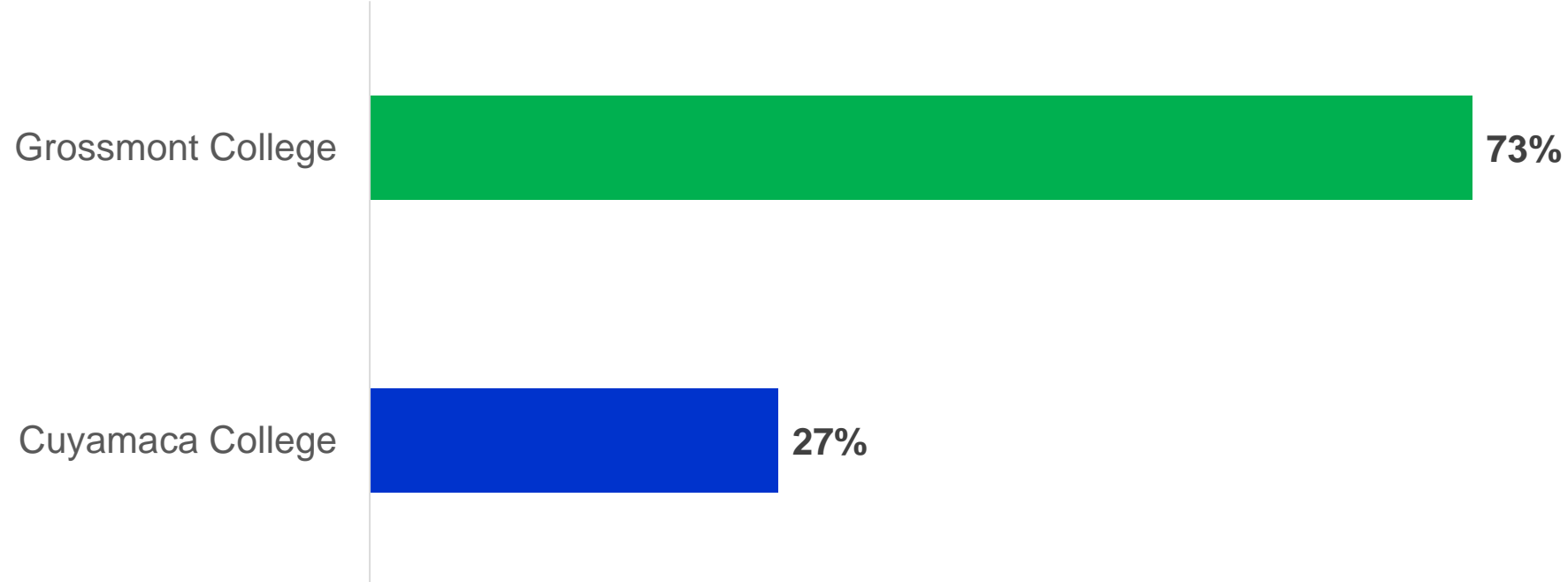
**Sent to all students who...**

- Enrolled at Cuyamaca College or Grossmont College between Fall 2020 and Spring 2021**
- Applied for admission for Summer/Fall 2021**

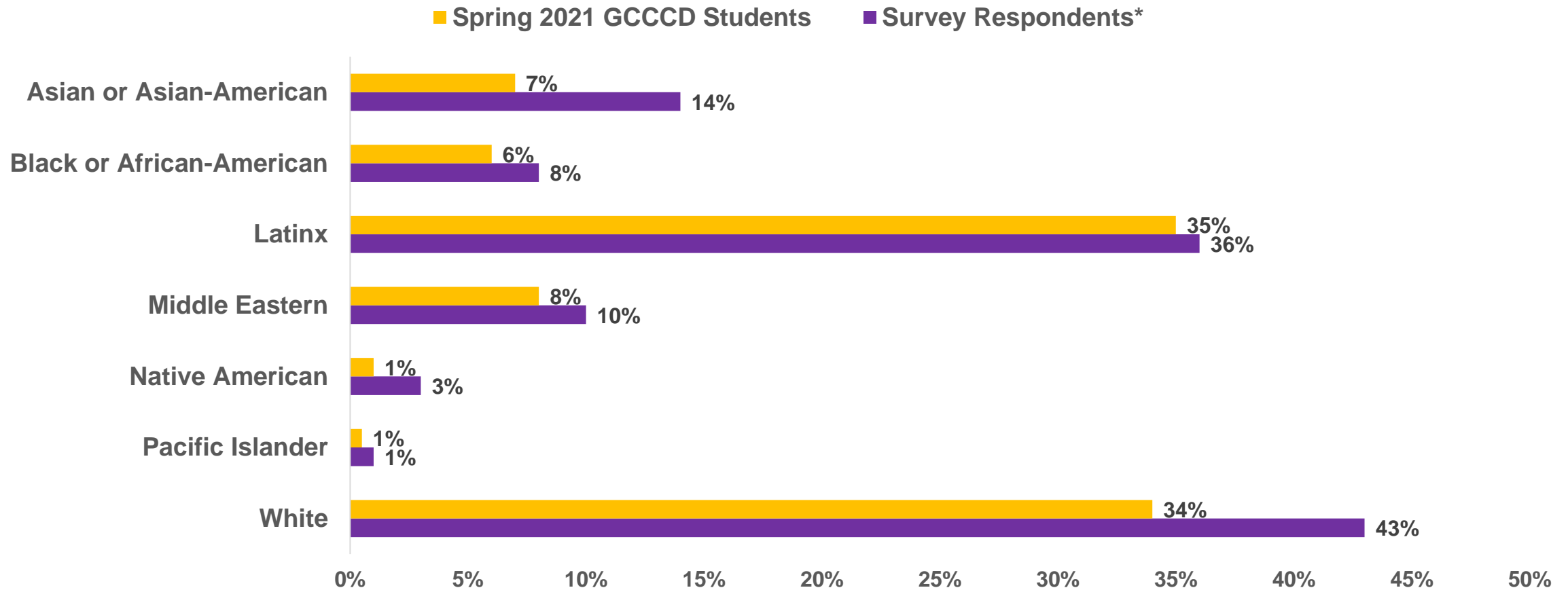
# STUDENTS WHO RESPONDED

6,626 students responded to the survey to date

*The vast majority of students identified Grossmont as their primary college*

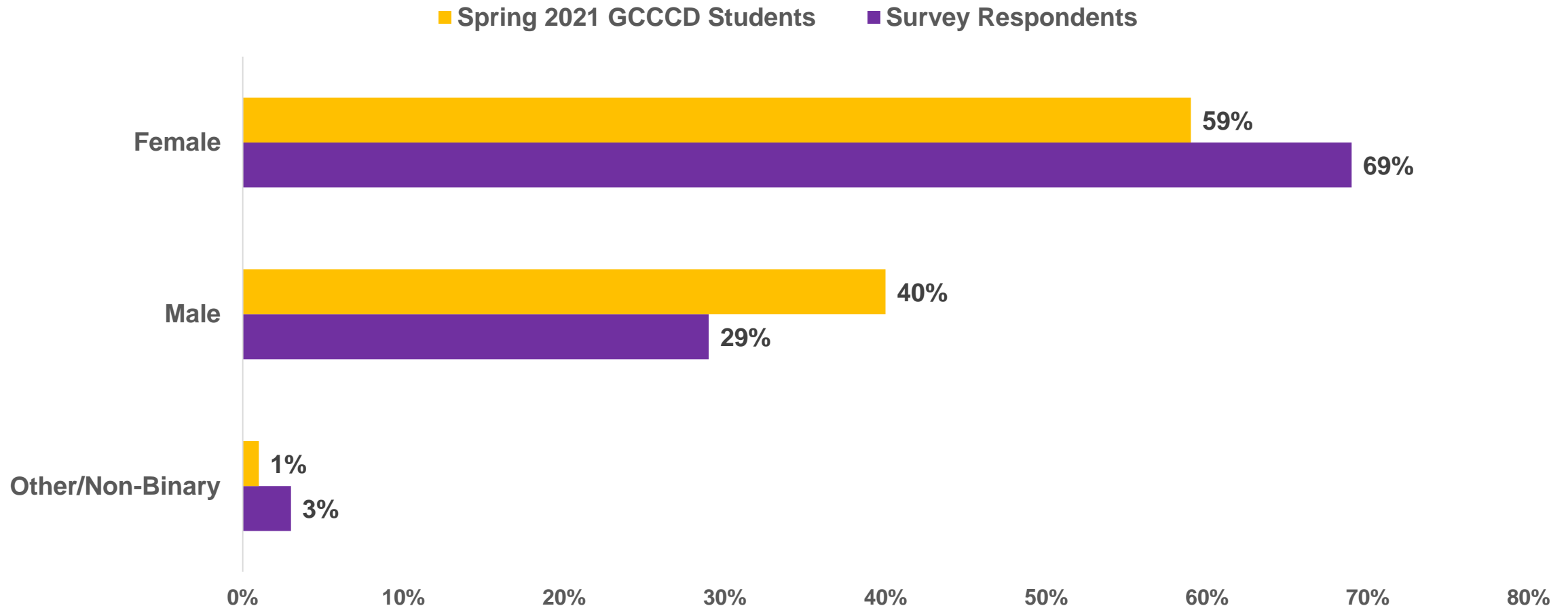


# STUDENTS WHO RESPONDED: RACE/ETHNICITY



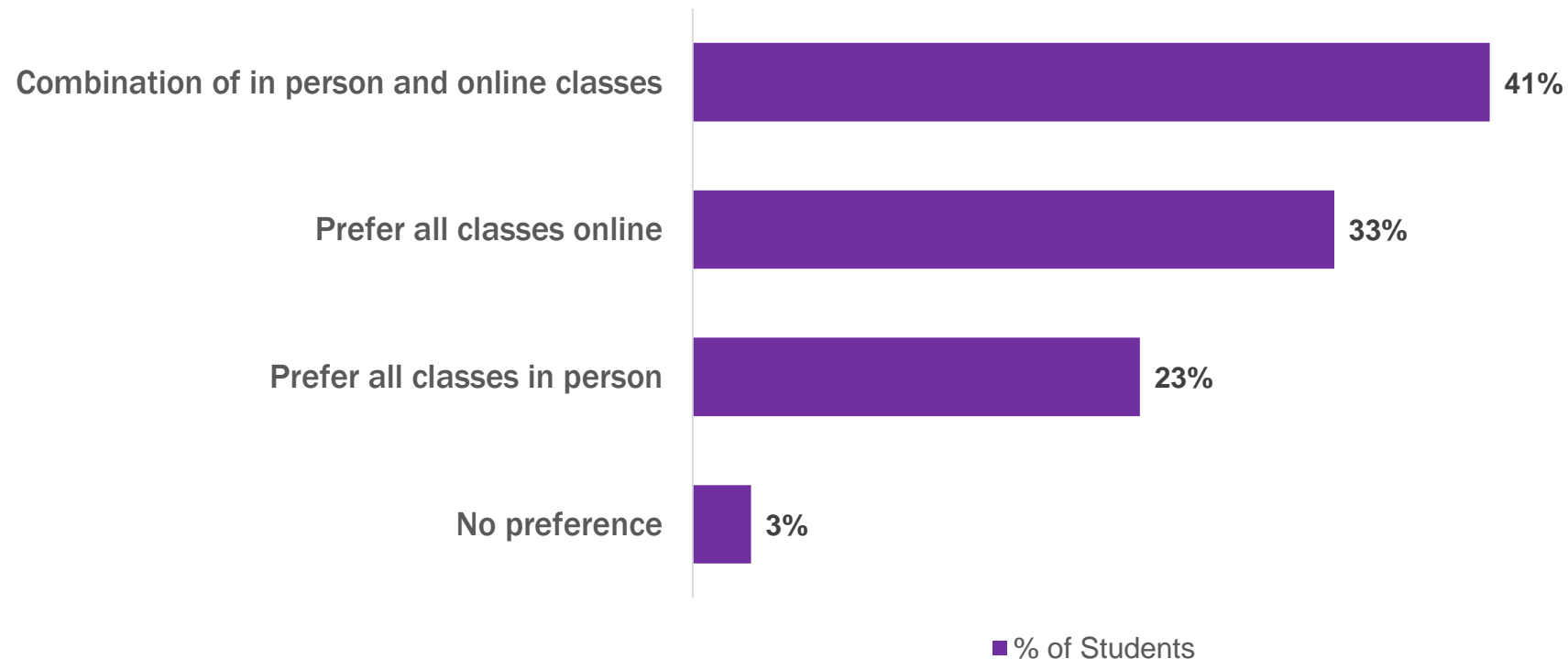
\*Respondents were able to select multiple race/ethnicity categories

# KEY FINDINGS: PREFERENCES FOR CLASSES

*The largest proportion of students preferred some combination of online and in-person classes for Fall 2021 and beyond*



# KEY FINDINGS: PREFERENCES FOR SERVICES

Students' preferences for services were mixed overall, with similar percentages of students preferring in-person, online, and a combination of in-person and online services.

However, a larger percentage of students showed a preference for the following services [in person](#):

- Library services
- Student engagement events activities
- Bookstore services
- Tutoring services

# KEY FINDINGS: PREFERENCES FOR SERVICES

Conversely, a larger percentage of students showed a preference for the following services [online](#):

- Assessment services
- Admissions and Records
- Test proctoring
- CalWORKs
- EOPS



# **KEY FINDINGS: PREFERENCES FOR SERVICES**

**Students were nearly evenly split in their preferences for the following services:**

- **Counseling**
- **Financial aid**
- **Career services**

# KEY FINDINGS: COVID-19 SAFETY PROTOCOLS

The majority of students indicated that daily temperature checks, reduced classroom capacity/social distancing, and wearing masks while on campus would not deter them from taking in-person classes

# KEY FINDINGS: COVID-19 VACCINE REQUIREMENT

Students were mixed on perceptions of required COVID-19 vaccinations and regular COVID-19 testing

- 49% said a vaccine requirement would not impact their decision to enroll in in-person classes
- 40% said a vaccine requirement would lead them to take online classes instead of in-person classes

# KEY FINDINGS: STUDENT CONCERNS

The majority (55%) of students expressed concerns about other students not following COVID-19 safety protocols and indicated this would impact their decision to enroll in in-person classes at the colleges.

Other significant concerns included:

- Work schedule (49%)
- Concerns about family members' health (45%) and own health (43%)
