MUSIC 116 – INTRODUCTION TO WORLD MUSIC

3 hours lecture, 3 units

Catalog Description

Designed to expand the student's perspective about the nature of music around the world and demonstrate the relationship between music in different cultures. Highlights elements common to all music. May include music of the cultures of India, China, Japan, Indonesia, Africa, Pacific Islands, the Middle East, Europe, and the Americas.

Prerequisite

Course Content

- 1) Survey of musical styles of India, China, Japan, Indonesia, African, the Pacific Islands, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas
- 2) Analysis of the prominent elements found in different musical systems
- 3) Overview of musical terms and concepts
- 4) Structural analysis of selected musical examples
- 5) Examination of the relationship between musical styles and cultural values

Course Objectives

Students will be able to:

- 1) Distinguish between folk, popular and classical music styles as they apply to various cultures.
- 2) Identify and observe the prominent musical style elements of different musical systems.
- 3) Define and recognize aurally pertinent musical terms and concepts.
- 4) Analyze the structure of various musical examples.
- 5) Relate the features of musical styles to larger cultural values.

Method of Evaluation

A grading system will be established by the instructor and implemented uniformly. Grades will be based on demonstrated proficiency in subject matter determined by multiple measurements for evaluation, one of which must be essay exams, skills demonstration or, where appropriate, the symbol system.

- 1) Exams and quizzes that measure students' ability to distinguish folk, popular, and classical music styles, identify and recognize aurally musical terms and concepts, identify and observe musical style elements within different musical systems, and relate those style elements to larger cultural values.
- 2) Final project that measures students' ability to distinguish folk, popular, and classical music styles; identify and observe musical style elements within different musical systems; relate those style elements to larger cultural values; and analyze the formal structure of selected musical examples.
- 3) Written concert reports that measure students' ability to identify and recognize aurally musical terms and concepts; identify and observe musical style elements within different musical systems; and relate those style elements to larger cultural values.
- 4) Homework assignments that measure students' ability to identify and observe musical style elements within different musical systems, and relate those style elements to larger cultural values.
