### **MUSIC 233 – CLASS PIANO IV**

3 hours lecture, 3 units

## **Catalog Description**

Continuation of MUS 232. Keyboard harmony and deceptive cadence. Reading an open score. Ensemble playing and accompaniment. Piano literature from the 18th through the 20th centuries.

## **Prerequisite**

"C" grade or higher or "Pass" in MUS 232 or equivalent

#### **Entrance Skills**

Without the following skills, competencies and/or knowledge, students entering this course will be highly unlikely to succeed:

- 1) Play intermediate piano pieces in ABA form with key modulations.
- 2) Play three-octave major and minor scales with hands together.
- 3) Use authentic and plagal cadences in harmonization exercises.
- 4) Compose and harmonize melodies.
- 5) Read four-part chorales.
- 6) Play ensemble music and/or accompaniments.
- 7) Analyze and discuss ternary form.

### **Course Content**

- 1) Major and minor scales played over four octaves
- 2) Use of deceptive cadence
- 3) Sight reading in open score
- 4) Ensemble playing
- 5) Accompaniment
- 6) Four-part chorales
- 7) Sight reading
- 8) Analysis of music and styles from different periods

## **Course Objectives**

Students will be able to:

- 1) Play beginning and intermediate piano pieces from four periods of music: Baroque, Classical, Romantic and 20th century.
- 2) Play selected major and minor scales, hands together, over four octaves.
- 3) Harmonize chord progressions with deceptive cadences.
- 4) Play an open score of three or four staves.
- 5) Discuss and compare the style features of Baroque, Classical, Romantic and 20th century compositions.
- 6) Compare and contrast music from the Baroque, Classical, Romantic and 20th century periods of music history.

#### **Method of Evaluation**

A grading system will be established by the instructor and implemented uniformly. Grades will be based on demonstrated proficiency in subject matter determined by multiple measurements for

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evaluation, one of which must be essay exams, skills demonstration or, where appropriate, the symbol system.

- 1) Regular performance assignments that measure students' ability to play pieces from different historical periods, harmonizations with deceptive cadences, and open score.
- 2) Performance examinations that that measure students' ability to play pieces from different historical periods, harmonizations with deceptive cadences, and open score.
- 3) Written examinations that measure students' ability to compare and contrast music from different styles and historical periods.
