MUSIC 237 – CHAMBER SINGERS

3 hours laboratory, 1 unit

Catalog Description

Study of standard and contemporary choral literature (classics to jazz) for small choral ensemble. Includes performances on campus and in local schools and communities. Open to all singers in the community and students of the college.

Course Content

- 1) Rehearsing choral music with other choral singers under the direction of the instructor
- 2) Choral techniques
- 3) Interpretation of music symbols
- 4) Phrasing and expression
- 5) Relevant facts about the composer
- 6) Analysis and discussion of selected musical compositions
- 7) Discussion of different musical styles

Course Objectives

Students will be able to:

- 1) Demonstrate proper breathing, vocal techniques, posture, and stage deportment.
- 2) Solve musical problems in pitch, tone, blend, dynamics, rhythm, articulation, phonation and resonance.
- Compare and contrast musical interpretations of assigned choral music.
- 4) Distinguish musical differences among various styles.
- 5) Interpret music within established stylistic parameters.
- 6) Assist in designing and implementing musical performances.

Method of Evaluation

A grading system will be established by the instructor and implemented uniformly. Grades will be based on demonstrated proficiency in the subject matter determined by multiple measurements for evaluation, one of which must be essay exams, skills demonstration or, where appropriate, the symbol system.

- 1) Oral, written and performance exams that measure students' ability to read and execute musical scores with technical accuracy, correct posture and breathing, and appropriate stylistic inflections.
- 2) Participation in rehearsals and public performances that measures students' ability to perform musical works in a public setting with technical accuracy, correct posture and breathing, and appropriate stylistic inflections.
